
Brothers Celebrate Silver Jubilees

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In an intimate gathering last June 6, the community of Brothers at Mount Assumption Institute, Plattsburg, N. Y. celebrated the silver jubilee of religious life of Brother Dacian, principal. A high Mass of thanks- giving was sung by the Reverend Father Tardiff, OM.I., pastor of St. Peter's parish; in the evening, congratulations were offered at a convivial dinner.

Born January 5, 1916, ill Fall River, Mass. of parents staunchly loyal to the Church and devoted to its interests, Brother Dacian was educated at Notre Dame School and in our just then organized Monsignor Prevost High School. He entered our training school at Laprairie in 1928. He definitively joined the ranks of the Brothers of Christian Instruction on his first profession day, August 15, 1932.

Brother Dacian taught successively in Montreal and Buckingham, Quebec, Alfred and Biddeford, Me., before being appointed principal of St. Louis High School in 1946, Three years later he traveled to Europe to follow the exercises of the second novitiate. Upon his return, he became principal of Msgr. Prevost High School. From there, he was transferred, in 1955, to Mount Assumption, which boasts the third largest community of the order.


To the office of principal, Brother Dacian brought an extensive pedagogical background. He earned his B. A, and B. Ped. degrees simultaneously in 1940 from the University of Montreal and was awarded an M, A, in education from St. Michael's College in 1945, Education is his primary interest; he pursued graduate studies in education at The Catholic University of America, Fordham University, and Boston College during recent summer sessions.

Brother Dacian possesses those qualities, which mark the religious of deep conviction and the efficient administrator. A member of the provincial council from its inception, he has shown prudent judgment and a profound understanding of the religious life.

All the members of the Notre Dame District offer Brother Dacian their very best wishes on the occasion of his silver anniversary.

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
Brothers Benjamin and Louis Sail for Europe

Brother Romaric was born in Winslow, Me., on February 5, 1914. He entered the juniorate at Alfred, Me., in 1931 and rc-


BROTHERS RECEIVE NEW APPOINTMENTS

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LA MENNAIS COLLEGE Alfred ME

Brother Thomas Stephen, F.I.C., President of the college, and Brother Conrad Joseph, F.I.C., Head of the Education Department, attended a Workshop in Higher Education at Milligan College, Johnson City, Tennessee, August 10-17. Representatives of the sixty-one-college membership of The Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges participated in the weeklong sessions. The workshop, financed by the Council for Financial Aid, dealt with problems of teaching and curriculum as revealed in a testing program that was carried out in all C.A.S.C. colleges last spring.

On Wednesday, September 11, Dr. Hayden Anderson of the State Department of Education visited La Mennais College in connection with the continued certification of the college as a teacher-training institution of the State of Maine. He held a lengthy conference with a faculty committee composed of the President, the Dean and the Director of Student Teaching.

La Mennais College is becoming more than ever international. Small though our numbers may be, we have student representation from the following countries besides the United States: Canada, England and British East Africa.

During the 1957-58 academic year, La Mennais College will launch its first campaign for financial support from parents, relatives and friends of the Brothers. Large support from industry and business is not generally given to institutions such as ours. We must therefore turn to our natural constituency: those who know us and our work. Letters will be mailed shortly.

Sister Mary Alice, of the Sisters of Social Service, visited La Mennais College on September 12, and shared with us some of her community's experiences behind the Iron Curtain in Hungary. On the day she spoke, she was celebrating the tenth anniversary of her own escape from Communist China.

Brother Robert Alfred, F.I.C., Head of the Philosophy Department, has returned to The University of Notre Dame, South Bend. Indiana, for a final semester of work on his doctoral dissertation.

Brother Edmond Gabriel. F.I.C., Librarian, returned to The Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C., on September 16. He has one semester's work to complete for the degree of Master of Science in Library Science. Both Brother Edmond and Brother Robert will return to the college faculty next January.





Would You Be Interested?

Lately, the Brothers of Christian Instruction have opened a camp for boys at Naples, Maine, and staffed Cathedral Central High School in Detroit, Michigan. But they also had to refuse opening four other schools for lack of personnel. Year after year, for the same reason, offers to open new schools have to be turned down

The Catholic population of the United States is growing tremendously. Within ten years, 40,000 more religious teachers will be required in the Catholic schools of America. Will we have them? The recruiting problem is acute; it must be solved.

We have been working hard and have achieved some success in past years, But it takes 8 years to train a young man to teach. and it costs the Order approximately \$5,000. for each one. We must try harder still to achieve more in the recruiting field. Could we help one another to increase the number of religious apostles?

Suppose we were to pay you a 5% interest annually, as long as you live, would you be willing to deposit some money with us on a life income basis, a kind of charity and income benefits plan? The details would spell out as follows:

- We pay 5% interest annually on any amount given us, as long as the donor lives;
- The principal to become sale property of the Brothers of Christian Instruction upon death of donor.

This is a sound investment for time and eternity. You are lending money to God to help bring thousands of souls into heaven.
